

Book Club Questions for Holly by Stephen King

1. In the book "Holly," Stephen King introduces us to the character Holly Gibney. How does Holly's character evolve from her earlier appearances in Stephen King's works, such as "Mr. Mercedes" and "The Outsider"? Did you find her character development convincing?
2. How do you think the absence of supernatural elements affected the story? Did you miss these elements, or did you appreciate the change in focus?
